## What Are We Reading online articles worth clicking

Like many Americans, in between searching YouTube videos for talking pets and watching episodes of The Walking Dead (get in the house, Carl!), we occasionally read something educational online. There is a wealth of articles on the web that address a range of disability issues and we compiled a list of four that might be worth your time.

Because web addresses can take up a whole paragraph and are easy to enter incorrectly, we recommend entering the title of the article into your favorite search engine.

1) The New York Times recently published the article *A Chance to See Disabilities as Assets* by Peggy Klaus. The article addresses how the planning and time management skills that go into handling your disability can be presented as assets to potential employers.

2) Intellectualdisability.info posted the article *Family Issues* by Ray Jacques. This article was first published in *Psychiatry*; Volume 2:9, September 2003 and reprinted with permission from the Medicine Publishing Company. The article addresses how research is shifting away from the dysfunction families deal with when caring for someone with a disability towards the amazing resourcefulness of the families. This is an extensive and informative article.

3) Medical News Today adapted the article, from a 2012 article, in *A Greater Ability To Process Information Draws People With Autism To IT* from the *Journal of Abnor-*



mal Psychology. The title of the article says it all!  
4) *Parenting with a Disability* is an article excerpted from *The Parenting Book for Persons with a Disability: From Planning Your Family to Raising Adolescents*. So much research goes into parenting a child with a disability. But what about when it is the parent who has the disability? The article also contains other resources for parents with disabilities.

5) *The Impact of Childhood Disability - The Parent's Struggle* by Ken Moses, PH.D. is an excellent and very popular article about what a parent goes through when finding out and coming to terms with their child's disability.
